## Royal Live Oaks Academy hosts second annual Multicultural Parade

**HARDEEVILLE, SC** – Royal Live Oaks Academy of the Arts and Sciences Charter School (RLOACS) hosted the second annual Multicultural Parade on Thursday, April 28 on the school's campus. The theme of the parade was "10 Years of Diversity" in celebration of the school's upcoming ten-year anniversary in August of 2022.

Students of all ages carried flags, twirled ribbons, and performed dances inspired by research done in the classroom about countries around the world such as Venezuela, Kenya, China, Brazil, and India. Exchange students were able to represent their home countries with colorful flags and celebrations. Younger students, parents, and teachers lined the parade route to cheer on their peers.

"It's important for children to be able to appreciate other cultures. Seeing our children be able to perform and to show us what they know in a different way other than what they would do in the classroom is really exceptional for us," said Dr. Karen Wicks, founder and Executive Director of RLOACS. "My husband and I are the founders of this school, so [this event] tells us that we and a huge team did something right."

RLOACS will celebrate its tenth anniversary in August after opening its doors in 2012. RLOACS was renewed for another ten-year period by the Charter Institute at Erskine on April 20, 2022.
